Assessing evidence for challenges for marginalized population groups like Sinti & Roma and, amongst other areas, to lobby and advocate at EU/UN level to bring vision and the necessity of accessible eye health high on the agenda of decision makers as per the consultancy on status quo of eye health policy landscape in Europe	Internal desk review revealed, that Sinti & Roma face important health inequalities in accessing public health services and treatments (including prostheses), particularly in the case of eyesight, hearing, and dental conditions, which also affect the Roma population more than the majority. Spain recommendation: Foster a more inclusive and universal health system, incl. by making services that are not free, affordable (oral/dental, hearing, eyesight) and to cover additional incurred expenses. Objectives

To lobby and advocate at EU and country level (Eastern Europe) to bring vision and the necessity of accessible eye health high on the agenda of decision makers. Over 70 Mio people in Europe live with vision loss. Increasing aging pop. mean greater prev. of diabetes, cataract, presbyopia, MD, glaucoma, RE like myopia are emerging as a leading cause of VI & blindness in children. Fragmentation of current eye care systems in most European countries are building big challenges to these growing public health crises, and the problem of eye health in Europe will only get worse.

Activity Status Update

Eye health challenges are addressed through IAPB advocacy efforts through a 3-part approach:

- Convene a European Advocacy Network whose members engage on eye health in Europe. A jointly agreed upon action plan based on key objectives needs to be developed. Peer support to members advocating for eye health in their own countries should be provided.
- Foster leadership on eye health in Europe at EU level through stronger engagement of interested and motivated European member states who are willing to provide leadership by addressing eye health challenges in the region.
- Awareness raising of challenges in eye health amongst European policymakers through MEPs and the public, incl. an eye screening event during WSD at the EU Parliament.

Comments

Challenges:

In June 2024, a new Commission shall be elected, after which our advocacy should have the right momentum for a solid ground for political involvement

If political involvement can be established by IAPB, adequate personnel needs to be availed at the IAPB European regional level

Membership growth within the European region is intended to further strengthen the entire IAPB agency
